Network and Zones

The role of the Student Council Structure

The Student Council is the top-level it provides a space for students to attend and to hear some of the biggest student facing issues. There is also a chance to better understand the governance. The space in which a topic is discussed depends on how widely the issue, or solution, will span across different groups.

Student Council

Here, the wider student facing issues are discussed, debated, and implemented as necessary. An overview of the operational plan, chaired by a neutral chair as opposed to an FTO, as well as a look into the wider budget drafting will be part of the key structures of Student Council, as well as a more 'AGM' approach for students steering the direction of the SU.

Network leads are expected to attend these meetings and vote on the motions and policies.

Meetings occur once a term organised by the Student Voice Team

Example - Access Ramps

For example, if a group of students want to introduce access ramps to a new part of campus, they will first bring it to the Students with Disabilities Network, where it will be discussed to consult a wider group who it will affect.

If the change needs more students involved to take the case to the university, it can be escalated to the Zone level to get the backing and approval of other student networks. An issue should also be escalated if it will affect more than one group in the zone, e.g., increased funding for sports may reduce funding for societies.

If the change will cause temporary disruption to a sports facility, the Student Council should discuss the issue and solution to find a way that works best for all students.

Networks

This is where network level issues and solutions get solved through working within their groups. The Network Leads' role will facilitate and coordinate action that can be achieved at network level. Within this system there is space for assistance from the FTOs to be called on if the issues are bigger or affect a wider group of students, so they be escalated to the next level.

The Networks is the main space associated with your role. You are responsible for organising and chairing these meetings. There must be at least one Network meeting in-between the zone meetings. The regularity and agenda of Network gatherings are for you and your network to organise to what best suites you. Networks are the space for you to come together as a community, a forum to hear the issues you are facing, questioning how to action or create change. It is also important for you as the Lead to report back on changes or agreements made in the Zone and Student Council meetings.

Zones

This is the first level in which wider discussion and conversation can happen, as well as the first public opportunity for the FTOs to share their knowledge and help. This can also be the first stage in which an issue raised by a group who sits outside a network can bring for discussion - or to implement a new network. Network leads sit in these spaces and discuss changes and escalate their large action that cannot be completed within the community of the Network. Meetings occur every four weeks, organised by the Student Voice Team

RESPONSIBILITIES OF ALL NETWORK LEADS

ENGAGE

All members of the SU Student Council have been elected by the student body to ensure that you represent their interests to the Students' Union and the University and therefore engage regularly with students, covering all campuses and student groups. An example of this would be the Women+ NL should represent and regularly engage with that specific group of students. It is important that members attend the meetings of the Student Council in order to bring forward matters of interest to students, to debate and consider new student policy motions, and to ask questions of and hold the Full-Time Officers to account for their actions.

ABSENCE

If you find you are unable to attend a SU Student Council meeting, you must send apologies to the Student Council Chair prior to the start of the meeting.

Failure to attend two consecutive meetings of the Student Council without apology may result in you having to step down from your role.





CAMPAIGNING

As a representative you have been elected to represent a specific group of students and campaign on behalf of your fellow students. Campaigning is a great part of the Students' Union work in making student life better across the whole University of Gloucestershire. Some things that we campaign on are: education, liberation, environment, welfare, campus based issues and the student experience as a whole.

The Students' Union will work directly with Full-Time and Network Leads to achieve the goal. You will be supported in developing any campaign ideas that you have by your mentor and Full-Time Officer and a budget may be available if required.




